
To Know Jesus

- 161. Very tenderly Jesus received the young ruler
- 162. He never sacrificed truth but uttered it in love.
- 163. The joy of seeing souls redeemed, souls eternally saved, is the reward of all that put their feet in the footprints of Jesus, who said, "Follow me."

"LAZARUS, COME FORTH"

- 164. The Saviour blessed all who sought His help.
- 165. Jesus had no home of His own; He was dependent on the hospitality of His friends and disciples.
- 166. When weary and thirsting for human fellowship He found peace in the home of Lazarus
- 167. Our Saviour appreciated a quiet home and interested listeners. He longed for human tenderness, courtesy and affection.
- 168. Jesus desired men to realize more fully the regard that God bestows on the human instrumentalities He has created.
- 169. Jesus answered Martha with mild and patient words.
- 170. Jesus had strong affection for the family of Bethany
- 171. As long as I(Jesus) do His(the Father) will my life is safe.
- 172. During this time Jesus had the guardianship of heavenly angels
- 173. He felt every pang of anguish and sorrow that the sisters felt.
- 174. He tarried, that by raising Lazarus form the dead, He might give to His stubborn, unbelieving people another evidence that He was the resurrection and life.
- 175. His heart was breaking because of their impenitence. In His mercy He purposed to give them one more evidence that He was the Restorer
- 176. On His way to Bethany, Jesus, according to His custom, ministered to the sick and needy.
- 177. In Jesus` expressive face Martha read the same tenderness and love that had always been there.
- 178. With human and divine pity, Jesus looked into Martha's sorrowful careworn face.
- 179. Christ could have stripped the Jews from their robe of pretended sorrow. But He restrained His righteous indignation because of the loved one kneeling at His feet in sorrow, who truly believed in Him.

- 180. Jesus wept. His tender, pitying heart is ever awakened to sympathy by suffering.
- 181. In His tears there was a sorrow as the heavens are higher than the earth. He wept because of those who were planning His death.
- 182. The weight of the grief of ages was upon Him.
- 183. His heart was pierced with the pain of the human family of all ages and in all lands. The woes of the sinful race were heavy upon His soul. He longed to relieve all their distress.
- 184. Christ reproved Martha, but His words were spoken with the utmost gentleness.
- 185. Calmly Christ stands before the tomb.
- 186. It was with faith and prayer that He wrought His miracles.
- 187. His voice, clear and penetrating, pierces the ear of the dead.
- 188. In His face, which is lighted up by the glory of God, the people see the assurance of His power.

PRIESTLY PLOTTINGS

- 189. The miracles He performed on the Sabbath were all for the relief of the afflicted.
- 190. His example of self-denial and disinterested benevolence was before them. His life of purity, of suffering and devotion was known to all.
- 191. His life by the priest had been one of persecution and insult. He who was ever touched by human woe, who healed the sick, restored sight to the blind, hearing to the deaf, and speech to the dumb, who fed the hungry and comforted the sorrowful was driven from the people He had laboured to save.

THE LAW OF THE NEW KINGDOM

- 192. Jesus bears tenderly with the disciples
- 193. He will not rebuke, but deepen and purify.
- 194. Christ called men not to authority, but to service, the strong to bear the infirmities of the weak.

ZACCHAEUS

- 195. The report of One who had borne Himself with kindness and courtesy toward the proscribed classes, had spread far and wide.
- 196. Zacchaeus had been overwhelmed of the condescension of Christ in stooping to him, so unworthy.

THE FEAST AT SIMON'S HOUSE

- 197. Jesus had pardoned Mary Magdelene's`sins and had brought relief to her mind.
- 198. Jesus was gladdened with the assurance of her faith and her love.
- 199. Christ values acts of heartfelt courtesy. When one did Him a favour, with heavenly politeness He blessed the actor.
- 200. Christ delighted in the earnest desire of Mary to do the will of her Lord.
- 201. The matchless excellence of the character of Christ filled her soul.
- 202. The disciples' expression of their love for Him would be pleasing to Christ.
- 203. In the gift of Jesus, God gave all heaven.
- 204. God's Son must act in God's way with compassion, tenderness and mercy.
- 205. The Saviour's heart is grieved when His children neglect to show their gratitude to Him by words and deeds of love.
- 206. Simon was touched by the kindness of Jesus in not openly rebuking him before the guests and became a lowly sacrificing disciple.
- 207. Seven times Mary had heard Jesus` rebuke of the demons. She had heard His strong cries to the Father in her behalf. She knew how offensive sin is to His unsullied purity.
- 208. The plan of redemption has invested humanity with great possibilities.

209. The souls that turn to Him for refuge, Jesus lifts above the accusing and the strife of tongues. No man or evil angel can impeach these souls.

"THEY KING COMETH"

- 210. The animal on which He rode was that ridden by the kings of Israel
- 211. No train of mourning captives, as trophies of kingly valour, made a feature at that scene, but those He had healed were the glorious trophies of His labours of love for sinful man.
- 212. Widows and orphans were exalting the name of Jesus for His works of mercy to them.
- 213. His eyes filled with tears, and His body rock to and fro like a tree before the tempest, while a wail of anguish bursts from His quivering lips, as if from the depths of a broken heart. What a sight was this for the angels to behold! Their loved Commander in an agony of tears | Israel's King in tears of insuppressible agony.
- 214. His was no selfish sorrow. It was the sight of Jerusalem that pierced the heart of Jesus.
- 215. Jesus wept over the beloved city. How can I give thee up?

A DOOMED PEOPLE

- 216. Christ's act in cursing the fig tree had astonished the disciples, unlike His ways and works. They had known Him as the Restorer, the Healer.
- 217. But it is in mercy and love that He lifts the veil from the future, and reveals to men the results of a course of sin.
- 218. Jesus had come to Israel hungering to find in them the fruits of righteousness, compassion, zeal for God, and a deep yearning of soul for the salvation of their fellowman.
- 219. Christ's act in cursing the fig tree stands as a warning to all churches and to all Christians.

- 220. He declares that the open sinner is less guilty than is he who professes to serve God, but who bears no fruit to His glory.
- 221. Christ is shedding bitter tears for you and me.

THE TEMPLE CLEANSED AGAIN

- 222. His stern and Godlike demeanour had struck terror to the hearts of the scheming traders.
- 223. The sacredness of the sacrificial service had been a great measure destroyed.
- 224. Jesus stood before them with the majesty of heaven's King with a dignity and glory He had never manifested before.
- 225. Christ spoke with a power that swayed the people like a mighty tempest, His voice like a trumpet and the displeasure of His countenance seemed like a consuming fire.
- 226. There were none who dared question His authority.
- 227. Again the temple court was filled with the sick and the dying, and once more Jesus ministered to them. And the children were foremost in rejoicing.
- 228. The Majesty of heaven, without adornment of display, His garments were travel-stained. His face was pale, and expressed a patient sadness; yet written there were dignity and benevolence.
- 229. In His contest with the rabbis, it was not Christ's purpose to humiliate His opponents. He was not glad to see them in a hard place.
- 230. Looking with pity upon them, He sought by every mean in His power to make plain to them the nature of the deed they were about to do.
- 231. Those who trust in Him, He never disappoints. He has endured the pressure of Adam's guilt, and the guilt of his posterity, and has come off more than conqueror of the powers of evil.
- 232. Without the life of Christ in us, we cannot withstand the storms of temptations.

CONTROVERSY

- 233. Christ testifies to a future life beyond the present, to God as a Father of the children of men, ever watchful of their true interests
- 234. God counts the things that are not, as though they were. He sees the end from the beginning, and beholds the result of His work as though it were now accomplished

 There will be a close and tender relationship between God

WOES ON THE PHARISEES

and the risen saints

- 235. Jesus, the young Galilean, stood calmly before the priests, with the dignity of a king. He looked unflinchingly upon His adversaries.
- 236. People were charmed by His teaching.
- 237. The expressive countenance, the speaking eye, will testify to the blameless character of the one who loves and honours the word of God.
- 238. In such plain words the Saviour revealed the selfish ambition of His opponents.
- 239. This hypocrisy, Christ declared would bring them the greater damnation.
- 240. Jesus reads every purpose of the heart.
- 241. Christ unsparingly condemned abuses, but He was careful not to lessen obligation.
- 242. The listeners shuddered. Never was the impression made by His word and His look to be effaced.
- 243. Keen and searching had been His denunciation of sin; but He spoke no words of retaliation. He had a holy wrath against the prince of darkness, but He manifested no irritated temper.
- 244. Divine pity marked the countenance of the Son of God.
- 245. This is the separation struggle from Jerusalem. In the lamentation of Christ the very heart of God is pouring itself

forth. It is the mysterious farewell of the longsuffering love of the Deity,

IN THE OUTER COURT

- 246. The outworking in them of Christ's own character and spirit, is His reward and will be His joy throughout eternity.
- 247. Christ was already drinking the cup of bitterness. His humanity shrank from the hour of abandonment; He would be deserted by God. When all would see Him stricken, smitten of God and afflicted. He shrank from public exposure, of being treated as the worst of criminals, from a shameful and dishonoured death.
- 248. A foreboding of His conflict with the powers of darkness, a sense of the awful burden of human transgressions and the Father's wrath because of sin, caused the spirit of Jesus to faint, and the pallor of death to overspread His countenance
- 249. The Majesty of heaven consented to suffer as the Sin Bearer to glorify His Father's name.
- 250. The defaced image of God will be restored in humanity.

ON THE MOUNT OF OLIVES

251. Christ has given signs of His coming. He declares that we may know when He is near, even at the door.

THE LEAST OF THESE, MY BRETHREN

- 252. He identifies Himself with every child of humanity.
- 253. God is no respecter of person. He has an equal care for all the souls He has created.
- 254. The chief Shepherd will minister to those who ministers to others.
- 255. He will fulfill all His promises. They will burn in our hearts, and kindle upon our lips.

A SERVANT OF SERVANTS

- 256. The interview between Jesus and His disciples were usually seasons of calm, joy, highly prized by all.
- 257. Jesus was troubled, His heart burdened, something weighed heavily upon His mind. The disciples sympathized with His grief.
- 258. He did not think of Himself. His care for His disciples was uppermost in His mind.
- 259. The contention about who would be the greatest carried on in the presence of Christ, grieved and wounded Him.
- 260. They understood His unspoken rebuke.
- 261. Jesus had a full consciousness of His divinity yet He had taken the form of a servant and washed the disciples' feet.
- 262. How grievous to Him is our evil temper, our vanity and pride.
- 263. Christ did not distract from His divinity.
- 264. Sin is seen in the light in which God views it.
- 265. Jesus longed for the soul of Judas. "How can I give thee up?"

IN REMEMBRANCE OF ME

- 266. In the treatment of Judas, Christ wanted His disciples to consider as to the patience and mercy of God toward the most grievously erring.
- 267. In the death of Christ, we owe even the bread we eat.

LET NOT YOUR HEART BE TROUBLED

- 268. Christ looked upon the disciples with divine love and with tenderest sympathy and He would have joy in glorifying the Father's name.
- 269. The Saviour was deeply anxious for His disciples to understand for what purpose His divinity was united to humanity.
- 270. His perfect humanity is what all His followers may possess, if they will be in subjection to God as He was.
- 271. Because of the imputed righteousness of Christ His followers are accounted precious.

- 272. The Lord will teach us our duty. He will speak His mysteries to us personally.
- 273. By His spirit, the Saviour would be accessible to all. In the sense He would be nearer to them if He had not ascended on high. Sin would be resisted and overcome through the mighty agency of the Holy Spirit.
- 274. His voice was heard in a song of praise, the joyful notes of the Passover hallel.
- 275. As they began to descend toward the mount, Jesus in a tone of deepest sadness.
- 276. God desires to manifest through you the holiness, the benevolence, the compassion of His own character.
- 277. Christ rejoices that He can do more for His followers than they can ask or think.
- 278. Christ did not fail neither was He discouraged and His followers are to manifest a faith of the same enduring nature.

<u>GETHSEMANE</u>

- 279. He had a heart full of sorrow. His last agony.
- 280. Never before had the disciples seen Him so sad and silent. His sadness deepened. His steps were with laboured effort.
- 281. As the substitute and surety for sinful man, Christ was suffering under divine justice. His soul was filled with dread of separation from God.
- 282. The heart of Jesus longed for sympathy in His suffering.
- 283. He would have been comforted and relieved by the steadfast faith of His disciples.
- 284. Jesus `faith was not change by anguish
- 285. The weakness of the disciples awakened the sympathy of Jesus
- 286. They saw His face marked with the bloody sweat of agony.
- 287. The humanity of the Son of God trembled in that trying hour. Jesus now prayed for His own tempted, agonized soul.

- 288. He sees that the transgressors left to themselves will perish. His decision is made He will save man at any cost to Himself.
- 289. God suffered with His Son. Angels beheld the Saviour's agony. They saw their Lord enclosed by legions of Satanic forces
- 290. After receiving help from the angel, Christ's agony did not cease, but His depression and discouragement left Him.
- 291. He had tasted the sufferings of death for every man.
- 292. The disciples saw the angel lift the Saviour's head upon his bosom, and point toward heaven. They heard the angel's voice like sweetest music, speaking words of comfort and hope
- 293. Jesus had the opportunity to escape, but He remained calm and self-possessed.
- 294. Jesus saw how weak was the faith of His disciples, and He sought to shield them from temptation and trial. For them He was ready to sacrifice Himself.
- 295. His voice trembled with sorrow as He added, "Judas betrayest thou the Son of man with a kiss."
- 296. With dignity He talked to the priests.

BEFORE ANNAS AND THE COURT OF CAIAPHAS

- 297. The Saviour was in bonds and closely guarded and He moved painfully.
- 298. Jesus spoke no burning word of retaliation. His calm answer came from a heart sinless, patient and gentle that would not be provoked.
- 299. Christ suffered keenly under abuse and insult. He suffered in proportion to the perfection of His holiness and His hatred of sin.
- 300. He who could have doomed His enemies to death but He bore with their cruelty.
- 301. He was calm and serene with a noble, dignified, meek and majestic bearing.

- 302. Patiently Jesus listened to the conflicting testimonies and for a moment His divinity flashed through His guise of humanity.
- 303. Peter was drawn to his Master's gentle countenance and read a deep pity and sorrow, but there was no anger there.

JUDAS

- 304. The love of mammon overbalanced his love for Christ.
- 305. He witnessed the Saviour's mighty works in healing the sick, casting out devils and raising the dead.
- 306. Judas cultivated a disposition to criticize and accuse.

IN PILATE'S JUDGMENT HALL

- 307. Pilate looked upon Jesus and had never seen a man bearing marks of such goodness and nobility.
- 308. Jesus` face had no sign of guilt, no expression of fear, no boldness and defiance
- 309. Pilate saw a man of calm and dignified bearing, whose countenance bore not the marks of a criminal, but the signature of heaven
- 310. Jesus whole bearing gave evidence of conscious innocence. He stood unmoved by the fury of the waves that beat about Him.
- 311. Jesus stood silent, but His silence was eloquence. It was a light shining from the inner to the outer man.
- 312. Herod saw the serene face of the world's Redeemer, he read in it only wisdom and purity.
- 313. Yet Jesus` divine patience failed not.
- 314. Every feature of Jesus expressed gentleness and resignation and the tenderest pity for His cruel foes.
- 315. Pilate was filled with amazement at the uncomplaining patience of the Saviour.
- 316. The Roman governor was moved with sympathy for the suffering prisoner, (Jesus) who, condemned and scourged,

- with bleeding brow and lacerated back, still had the bearing of a king upon his throne.
- 317. The pitying Saviour, in the midst of His intense suffering and grief, excused as far as possible the act of the Roman governor who gave Him up to be crucified.
- 318. Pilate looked upon the Saviour. In the vast sea of upturned faces, His alone was peaceful. About His head a soft light seemed to shine.

CALVARY

- 319. Jesus prayed for His enemies.
- 320. Christ pitied them in their ignorance and guilt
- 321. As the dying thief cast himself upon a dying Saviour, quickly the answer came, soft and melodious, the tone full of love, compassion, and power the words: Verily I say unto thee today, Thou shalt be with Me in Paradise.
- 322. Christ's position between the thieves was to indicate that He was the greatest criminal of the three.
- 323. With amazement the angels beheld the infinite love of Jesus, who, suffering the most intense agony of others, and encouraged the penitent soul to believe.
- 324. O pitiful, loving Saviour; amid all His physical pain and mental anguish, He had a thoughtful care for His mother.
- 325. He remembered to provide for His sorrowing, widowed mother. The same spirit will be seen in every disciple of our Lord.
- 326. His suffering was from a sense of the malignity of sin, a knowledge that through familiarity with evil, man had become blinded to its enormity.
- 327. The wrath of God against sin, the terrible manifestation of His displeasure because of iniquity, filled the soul of His Son with consternation.
- 328. But now with the terrible weight of guilt He bears He cannot see the Father's reconciling face. The withdrawal of the divine countenance from the Saviour in this hour of

- supreme anguish pierced His heart with a sorrow that can never be fully understood by man. So great was His agony that His physical pain was hardly felt.
- 329. In the thick darkness, God veiled the last human agony of His Son and the face of Christ revealed serenity, benevolence the image of God.

IT IS FINISHED

- 330. Rebellion was not to be overcome by force.
- 331. Time was given for the working of Satan's principles, that they might be seen by the heavenly universe.
- 332. Jesus was prevented by every possible way to develop a perfect childhood, a faultless manhood, a holy ministry, and an unblemished sacrifice.

IN JOSEPH'S TOMB

- 333. As water and blood flowed from His side, Christ died of a broken heart. His heart was broken by mental anguish. He was slain by the sin of the world.
- 334. The disciples `faith had perished; but never had they loved their Lord as now. Never before had they so felt His worth, and their need of His presence.

<u>"THE LORD IS RISEN"</u>

- 335. Christ came forth from the tomb glorified and the Roman guard beheld Him.
- 336. As Christ arose, He brought from the grave a multitude of captives.

"WHY WEEPEST THOU?"

337. Peter's shameful denial of the Saviour was ever before him. To him Jesus gave the assurance that his repentance is accepted and his sin forgiven. He is mentioned by name.

338. Christ 'first work on earth after His resurrection was to convince His disciples of His undiminished love and tender regard for them.

THE WALK TO EMMAUS

- 339. Jesus longed to comfort the two disciples. He knew their hearts were bound with Him in love, and He longed to wipe away their tears and fill them with joy and gladness. But He must first give them lessons they would never forget by comparing the prophecies of the Old Testament with the history of the New.
- 340. Gladly Jesus would enter the humblest home, and cheer the lowliest heart. But if men are too indifferent to think of the heavenly guest, or ask Him to abide with them, He passes on.

"PEACE BE UNTO YOU"

- 341. He breathed unto them, and saith receive ye the Holy Spirit.
- 342. Toward those who fall into sin, the church has a duty, to warn, to instruct, and if possible to restore.
- 343. Jesus did not overwhelm Thomas with reproach, nor did He enter into controversy with him. He revealed Himself to the doubting one. Thomas had been most unreasonable in dictating the conditions of his faith, but Jesus, by His generous love and consideration, broke down all the barriers. Unbelief is seldom overcome by controversy. It is rather put upon self-defence and finds new support and excuse.
- 344. Let Jesus and His love and mercy, be revealed as the crucified Saviour, and from many once unwilling lips will be heard the acknowledgement of Thomas, "My Lord and my God

BY THE SEA ONCE MORE

- 345. By Jesus `instruction, the disciples had become elevated, intelligent and refined.
- 346. As the disciples had toiled all night, the lone watcher upon the shore followed them with His eye, while He Himself was unseen.
- 347. In dealing with Peter, Jesus taught His disciples to meet the transgressor with patience, sympathy and forgiving love.

GO TEACH ALL NATIONS

- 348. The first offer of mercy must be made to the murderers of the Saviour.
- 349. The disciples were to have the same power which Jesus had to heal "all manner of sickness and all manner of disease among the people."
- 350. They would testify of His power of healing of the soul.
- 351. Jesus told His disciples, "Go to the farthest part of the habitable globe, but know that my presence will be there. Labour in faith and confidence, for the time will never come when I will forsake you. This includes all believers in Christ to the end of time."
- 352. They shall lay hands on the sick and they shall recover.
- 353. He turned away none who came to receive His healing power.
- 354. It is our work to present the sick and suffering to Christ in the arms of faith. We should teach them to believe in the great Healer.
- 355. We should lay hold of His promise, and pray for the manifestation of His power.
- 356. The very essence of the gospel is restoration, and the Saviour would have us bid the sick, the hopeless and the afflicted take hold upon His strength.
- 357. Angels marvel at man's shallow appreciation of the love of God. How would a mother or father feel if their child, lost in the cold and the snow, had been passed by, and left to perish, by those who might have saved it?

- 358. Those whose course have been most offensive to Him He freely accepts when they repent.
- 359. Christ is waiting for His portrait in every disciple.
- 360. His holiness, meekness, and truth, are to be manifested in the world.
- 361. Christ desires to make man free, pure and holy.

TO MY FATHER AND YOUR FATHER

- 362. Jesus tarried on earth for a season, that His disciples might become familiar with Him in His risen and glorified body.
- 363. They could think of Him as glorified before the heavenly universe.
- 364. Jesus spent the time in conversation with them, repeating His former instruction
- 365. Jesus upbraided them not for their faults and failures; words of the deepest tenderness were the last that fell upon their ears from the lips of their Lord.
- 366. When the disciples went back to Jerusalem, their faces were aglow with a happiness not born of earth.
- 367. The disciples knew that they had a friend at the throne of God, and they were eager to present their requests to the Father in the name of Jesus.
- 368. All heaven was waiting to welcome the Saviour to the celestial courts. As He ascended, He led the way, the multitude of captives set free at His resurrection followed.
